Update on our Mural Project

Mural Project at Goose Lake Prairie State Natural Area is a project of the Goose Lake Prairie Partners. Chairman of the project is Chuck Johnson of Morris, IL. What follows is a description of the progress so far.

Our mural will be unveiled September 10th to an invited group who donated their money and/or time in moving the project along. About fifty to sixty people are expected.

It's on-going because the mural is only part of the overall mural project. The mural suggests many topics of interest to the viewers. The idea was to video interviews with people knowledgeable of a topic and then play the interviews through the new partner donated projector in the park auditorium.

During the first meeting with the videographers, one suggested we put the interviews on the Park's website so millions would be able to view them and learn about the area. The videographers were Joliet Junior College students taking a special intern course designed around our interviews. The summer term allowed for six interviews. These six must be approved by the I.D.N.R. before they can be uploaded to the park website, but can be viewed on the screen.

The first six listed below are part of nearly fifty interviews planned.

- Ken Sereno on the development of the Morris Area and Chief Shabbona
- Michele Micetich on the life of coal miners in Felix Township
- Dan Kirk, DNR Biologist, on the biology of a prairie park
- Joe Nyhoff, first park superintendent, on the Park's early days
- Joe Wheeler and Kelly Gutknecht, Naturalist at Midewin Natural Wildlife Refuge on bison
- Ray Grossi, the Muralist, about the planning and painting of the mural

Over forty more topics are planned to be recorded over the next several months. They range from glaciers, mega fauna and paleo-indians to quilting, nuclear power stations, and the Park's flora and fauna. Several PHDs from state universities will be interviewed.



J.J.C. will be providing four interns for the fall term and one of the summer interns will help to oversee the fall shooting. Additional funding will be required to continue the educational interviews. A goal of three thousand dollars is being projected to help pay for these educational interviews.

IDNR Conducting Survey, Planning Statewide Summit on Coordinating Monarch Butterfly Conservation in Illinois



Identifying ways to improve and increase habitat for monarch butterflies in Illinois is the focus of a new online survey this month and a planned conservation summit meeting in Springfield this September.

The Illinois Department of Natural Resources (IDNR), along with partners representing agriculture, transportation or utility rights-ofway, conservation lands, urban, and educational sectors are working to develop a plan to increase monarch butterfly habitat in Illinois.

"A first step is to identify ongoing monarch conservation efforts so that we can better coordinate among them to create more butterfly

habitat where it is needed," said Ann Holtrop, chief of the IDNR Division of Natural Heritage. "A survey has been developed to capture all of the diverse activities that are occurring for monarch butterfly conservation throughout the state."

Monarch butterfly populations have declined by as much as 90 percent over the last two decades. In the past year, Illinois has been designated as a high priority area for monarch conservation in strategies developed both by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service and the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Natural Resources Conservation Service. The monarch butterfly is the Illinois state insect, and the monarch was identified as a Species of Greatest Conservation Need in the most recent Illinois Wildlife Action Plan.

Results of the online survey will be analyzed and shared with interested groups and organizations during a statewide summit on monarch butterfly conservation to be held at the IDNR headquarters in Springfield on September 9.
